Harmonizing Relationships Between The African-Diaspora And Africans During The Obama Era

Southern Interdisciplinary Roundtable on African Studies (SIRAS)

March 25-28, 2010

Blacks, whether in Africa, Europe, Asia or the Americas have had a unique history and development. In the course of their experiences, they have met with hostilities, violence, wars, and destruction, all of which impacted their psyche and environment. Although some of these challenges were caused externally, a lot have internal origins, arising due to personal, national, societal and territorial ambitions. For example, although the Atlantic slavery had an external push arising out of the Europeans' economic interest, there were equally internal mechanisms, which promoted the trade in humans and devastated the environment. An instance of intent is the quoted statement of the African anti-abolitionist, Nzinga Mbemba of Southern Africa, who intoned, "You cannot stop a cat 'mousing,' I must die with a slave in my mouth." Although typically, Blacks born in the Diaspora and African-born immigrants have had a fairly good relationship, there are instances where these associations are marked with latent hostile feelings. Significant collaborations have not been achieved, making one wonder whether the existing peace and harmony are not simply the "peace of the graveyard."

In light of the recent positive developments in America and the world, and also within the black people's world, the roundtable, therefore, invites papers and debates that would address these issues, problems, challenges, and difficulties. It invites discussions on the overt and covert reasons for seemingly negative and hostile associations between the Africans and African-Diaspora in general and Africans and African-Americans in particular at the personal and professional levels. It is entirely appropriate at this juncture of our global history to rethink and re-conceptualize our relations at all levels of analysis. In this globalized world where no one walks alone, the conference is also interested in peace issues as they affect relationships of blacks to other peoples: Whites, Asians, Latinos, Arabs et cetera. We invite papers from all perspectives and disciplines so long as they underscore or elicit principles and patterns of relationships and peaceful coexistence, the aim being to harmonize relationships of all peoples and societies. Conference participants will be drawn from various universities and countries. The Roundtable will continue to feature students' research, giving them an opportunity to present their work in a professional setting as well as interact with other students and scholars.
